Sunday Session Details

Long Distance, Recreational Rides: Meet behind the hotel on the rail trail for one of three offerings:

- 1. A hardy road ride of ~20 miles to Mt. Morris with a stop at Rising Creek Café

- 3. A fast mountain bike ride to and around White Park

Local Education Tour

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Track 1: Engineering + Design

Continuing Education: The FHWA STAR Guide

Hosted by **Steve Bzomowski** of **Alta Planning + Design**. A two-and-a-half-hour workshop focused on the recent FHWA report: *Small Town and Rural Multimodal Networks* (FHWA-HEP-17-024). Geared towards the practicing engineer / planner or the professional liaison, this multi-hour session will include best practices gleaned from real-world projects both within and beyond our state: hear from Alta and other experienced practitioners from the consulting, research, and regulatory worlds. Participants will solve typology design issues for theoretical case studies using these new principles.

Continuing Education: FHWA Resurfacing Report

Nicholas Ross of **HDR** will present a detailed case study of a successful eastern panhandle road diet in the context of the recent FHWA Report: *Incorporating On-Road Bicycle Networks into Resurfacing Projects* (FHWA-HEP-16-025). An emphasis will be placed on the sequencing of new facilities with existing investments and routine maintenance.

Worked for Me: Neighboring State Bicycle & Pedestrian Programs

Moderated by Matt Mullenax of the Hagerstown/Eastern Panhandle MPO. Hear presentations by Peter Sotherland of the Maryland DOT on "Cycle Maryland Programs" and Angela Watson of the Pennsylvania DOT on *Priority Bicycle Networks* and Bicycle Occupancy Permit (BOP) pilot programs that allow local governments to build, sign, and maintain bicycle facilities on stated-owned roads.

Track 2: Planning + Funding

Leveraging Your Planning Resources: MPOs & RPDCs

Facilitated by Chandra Inglis-Smith from FHWA. Panel Members will include Steve Thomas of the Hagerstown/Eastern Panhandle MPO, Jing Zhang of the Morgantown Monongalia MPO, Tracy Brown of the Wood-Washington-Wirt Interstate Planning Commission, and Jody Sigmon of the Kentucky-Ohio-West Virginia Interstate Planning Commission. Participants will learn about effective use of community surveys, project prioritization, and best practices in regional bike plans. Learn about grant assistance / administration services and road safety audit resources.

Organize Your Community: Workshopping the BikePGH Bike/Ped Committee Toolkit

Hosted by **Eric Boerer** from **Bike Pittsburgh**, this session will walk participants through a toolkit aimed at developing autonomy and agency in their own communities. Participants will also hear lessons learned from West Virginia groups.

Policy: Reinforcing Our Theories via Practicable Code

Conversations facilitated by **Ginny Sullivan** of the **Adventure Cycling Association**. How can our municipal and state codes be updated to reflect our efforts on the ground?

Funding Opportunities

Facilitated by **Kent Spellman**. This multi-hour session will start with a panel discussion between grantors and grantees aimed at highlighting the structure and timelines behind successful projects. Participants will gain an insider's perspective of how to tackle funding opportunities for nonprofit and governmental municipal, regional, and statewide projects. The panel will transition into a detailed workshop design to help attendees map and collaborate on typical and alternative funding streams and grant programs.



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
